TOP STORYLINES

- After routing each of its last two opponents, Appalachian State looks to extend its winning streak to three when it hosts Sun Belt Conference foe UL Monroe on Saturday.
• Appalachian State (3-5, 2-2 Sun Belt) has blown out each of its last two opponents with a 53-14 triumph at Troy on Oct. 18 and 44-0 shutout over Georgia State last Saturday.
• A win against ULM would give Appalachian State its first three-game winning streak since it won the final three games of the 2012 regular season.
• ULM (3-5, 2-2 Sun Belt) has lost four-straight games but is coming off an impressive showing in last Saturday's 21-16 loss at Texas A&M.
• The Warhawks outgained Texas A&M, 347-243, and also held advantages in first downs (19-16), passing yards (269-106) and turnovers forced (2-1) in the narrow loss.
• ULM's 3-5 record is a bit deceptive, as it has

- played three road games against Southeastern Conference opponents (31-0 loss at LSU on Sept. 13, 48-14 loss at Kentucky on Oct. 11 and 21-16 loss at Texas A&M last Saturday).
• In addition to the three road tilts against SEC teams, the Warhawks hosted and beat Wake Forest of the Atlantic Coast Conference in their season opener (a 17-10 ULM win on Aug. 28).
• ULM is 0-4 on the road this season.
• During its current two-game winning streak, Appalachian State has outscored its opponents, 97-14, and compiled a total-yardage advantage of 1,078-370.
• Appalachian State's 469 rushing yards against Georgia State were the Mountaineers' most since they ran for 572 yards in a 52-28 win over Lenoir-Rhyne on Oct. 18, 1975.
• Thanks in large part to the its performance over the past three games, App State has

- moved to second in the Sun Belt in scoring (35.0 ppg), rushing (258.0 ypg) and total offense (469.0 ypg).
• The offensive surge has been led by reigning Sun Belt Offensive Player of the Week Marcus Cox, who ran for a career-high 250 yards last Saturday versus Georgia State and has amassed 373 rushing yards and six touchdowns over the past two games.
• Saturday's matchup pits the Sun Belt's top two defensive units. ULM leads the league in total defense (349.5 ypg) while App State ranks second at (366.6 ypg).
• Georgia State's 62 total yards were the fewest that Appalachian State has allowed since it surrendered just 39 yards in a 22-0 win over Guilford on Nov. 4, 1961.
• Appalachian State is in search of its first-ever win over an opponent from the state of Louisiana. The Mountaineers are 0-8 all-time against teams from the Bayou State.





AN APPALACHIAN STATE WIN WOULD ...

- up its record to 4-5 overall.
- move it above .500 in Sun Belt Conference play at 3-2.
- give it a three-game winning streak for the first time since it won the final three games of the 2012 regular season.
- move it to 21-1 in its last 22 November games at Kidd Brewer Stadium.
- be its seventh-straight "Black Saturday" win.
- be its first-ever over an opponent from the state of Louisiana.
- hand UL Monroe its first loss in three all-time games played in North Carolina.

AN APPALACHIAN STATE LOSS WOULD ...

- drop it to 3-6 overall and 2-3 in Sun Belt Conference play.
- snap a two-game winning streak.
- be only its second at home in the month of November since 2003.
- be its first on Black Saturday since 2007.
- drop it to 0-9 all-time against teams from the state of Louisiana.
- move ULM to 3-0 all-time in North Carolina.

NOTING SATURDAY'S WIN OVER GA. STATE

- In a driving High Country snowstorm, Appalachian State put together a second-straight dominating performance and routed visiting Georgia State, 44-0, last Saturday at Kidd Brewer Stadium.
- Highlighting the dominating performance, Appalachian State (3-5, 2-2 Sun Belt) out-gained Georgia State (1-8, 0-6 Sun Belt), 567-62, including a 469-8 advantage on the ground.
- The Mountaineers also easily outdistanced the Panthers in first downs (26-6), possession time (38:40-21:20) and third/fourth down conversions (11-of-18 for App State, 3-of-13 for GSU).
- Appalachian State's 469 rushing yards were its most since it ran for 572 yards in a 52-28 win over Lenoir-Rhyne on Oct. 18, 1975.
- Georgia State's 62 total yards were the fewest that Appalachian State has allowed since it surrendered just 39 yards in a 22-0 win over Guilford on Nov. 4, 1961.
- Georgia State's eight rushing yards were the fewest that Appalachian State has allowed

since it surrendered just five in a 55-21 win over North Carolina Central on Oct. 10, 2009.

- Appalachian State's 505-yard advantage in total yardage was its biggest since it out-gained Georgia Southern, 712-171, in a 52-16 win on Oct. 24, 2009.
- Georgia State, which came into the contest with the nation's 15th-ranked passing offense, managed just 54 yards through the air against the Mountaineers, which was the lowest passing total in GSU's five-year program history.
- Appalachian State took a 20-0 lead early in the second quarter and stretched the advantage to 27-0 on **Simms McElfresh's** 13-yard touchdown run on a fake field goal on the final play of the first half.
- The Mountaineers seemed content with the opportunity to take a 23-0 lead into halftime when they lined up for a 30-yard field-goal attempt with three seconds to go in the first half. However, after Georgia State took three-straight timeouts, McElfresh (App State's holder on field goals and PATs) took the snap, ran through a huge hole on the right side of the line and was barely touched by a defender as he glided into the end zone.
- Georgia State's lone scoring threat came early in the fourth quarter when it got the ball inside Appalachian's 20 yard line following a 35-yard return and a 15-yard penalty for an illegal tackle on the Mountaineers' only punt of the day.

- However, before it could get on the scoreboard, GSU botched a handoff exchange and App State defensive end **Deuce Robinson** recovered the fumble to keep the Mountaineers' second shutout of the season intact.

- For the third-straight game, Appalachian State featured two 100-yard rushers with **Marcus Cox** running for a career-high 250 yards and **Ricky Ferguson** chipping in with a career-high 123.

- Defensively, the Mountaineers forced three turnovers, including two takeaways by linebacker **John Law**. Law's interception and fumble recovery both came in the first 16:05 of the game and led to Appalachian State touchdowns.

NOTING UL MONROE

- UL Monroe (3-5, 2-2 Sun Belt) brings a four-game losing streak into Saturday's game at Kidd Brewer Stadium.
- After a 3-1 start, which included a season-opening 17-10 home win over Wake Forest, ULM has dropped four in a row. The Warhawks have not won since the calendar changed to October.

• ULM's 3-5 record is a bit deceiving, however, as three of its losses have come on the road against Southeastern Conference opponents (31-0 at LSU on Sept. 13, 48-14 at Kentucky on Oct. 11 and 21-16 at Texas A&M last Saturday).

• Despite the four-game skid, ULM was impressive in last Saturday's 21-16 loss at Texas A&M. The Warhawks outgained Texas A&M, 347-243, and also held advantages in first downs (19-16), passing yards (269-106) and turnovers forced (2-1) in the narrow loss.

• ULM is 0-4 on the road this season.

• Saturday's game will be the Warhawks' fourth road contest in their last five games. Since the beginning of October, ULM has played at home only once (a 22-18 loss to Texas State on Oct. 25).

• ULM leads the Sun Belt in total defense, allowing 349.5 yards per game.

• The Warhawks also rank second in the league in rushing defense (150.6 ypg) and are fourth in scoring defense (26.4 ppg), passing defense (198.9 ypg) and passing-efficiency defense (124.2).

• On the other hand, ULM is one of the Sun Belt's worst offensive teams. The Warhawks are last in the 11-team league in scoring (17.4 ppg), rushing (91.1 ypg) and passing efficiency (111.4). They rank 10th in total offense (336.1 ypg).

• ULM is 3-1 all-time against teams from the state of North Carolina, including a 2-0 mark when playing in the Old North State. When it was known as the Northeast Louisiana Indians, ULM split a home-and-home series with East Carolina (L, 45-0, in Monroe, La. in 1965; W, 21-14, in Greenville, N.C. in 1966). Over the past two seasons, the Warhawks swept a home-and-home series from Wake Forest (W, 21-19, in Winston-Salem, N.C. in 2013; W, 17-10, in Monroe, La. on Aug. 28).

- Appalachian State is 0-8 all-time versus opponents from the state of Louisiana.
- The Mountaineers are 0-2 when playing a team from Louisiana at home and 0-6 when playing in the Bayou State.

NOVEMBER REIGN

Appalachian State has proven to be nearly unbeatable at Kidd Brewer Stadium when the calendar has turned to November over the past decade.

The Mountaineers are 20-1 in their last 21 November games at The Rock. Since 2003, App State's only home loss in the month of November was a 35-28 setback at the hands of eventual Southern Conference co-champion Chattanooga on Nov. 2 of last season.

While its lone loss was a narrow seven-point defeat, Appalachian's 20 wins during that span have come by an average score of 38-17.

BLACK SATURDAY

Appalachian State has won the last six annual Black Saturday games at Kidd Brewer Stadium.

The Mountaineers have not lost a Black Saturday contest since it dropped a 38-35 decision to Georgia Southern on Oct. 20, 2007.

APPALACHIAN STATE MAKES SUN BELT, FBS DEBUT IN 2014

The 2014 campaign is Appalachian State's first as a member of the Sun Belt Conference and NCAA Division I FBS.

Appalachian State was a member of the Southern Conference since 1972 and played in NCAA Division I-AA/FCS since the SoCon became a part of the subdivision in 1982.

Appalachian State accepted an invitation to join the Sun Belt Conference on March 27, 2013 and officially became a member of the league on July 1, 2014.

The 2014 season is Appalachian State's second in an NCAA-mandated two-year reclassification process from Division I FCS to Division I FBS.

The Mountaineers play a full Sun Belt Conference schedule and are eligible to win the Sun Belt Championship in 2014 but, due to the two-year reclassification process, are not eligible to participate in a postseason bowl game.*

Appalachian State becomes bowl-eligible in 2015.

*Exception: If there are not enough teams with .500 records to fill all 76 bowl slots, bowls are obligated to extend an invitation to transitioning FBS teams before an established sub-.500 FBS team.

NATIONAL RANKINGS

While Appalachian State is in its first season as a member of NCAA Division I FBS, it has a history with the Associated Press Top 25 poll.

Appalachian State's 34-32 win over No. 5 Michigan in 2007 prompted the AP make all NCAA Division I teams eligible to receive votes in its Top 25 poll. Prior to Appalachian's historic win at Michigan, voters could only include NCAA Division I FBS teams on their ballots. The new policy was dubbed the "Appalachian State Rule" by some.

Following the policy shift, App State received votes in the AP Top 25 poll on three occasions in 2007, including seven points in the season's final poll, good for a tie for 34th overall.

The Mountaineers are 1-3 all-time against nationally ranked FBS opponents.

OFFENSE

Appalachian State's offense has been one of the nation's best over the last three games (Oct. 11 vs. Liberty, Oct. 18 at Troy and last Saturday vs. Georgia State). During that three-game span, the Mountaineers have scored 145 points and totaled 1,755 yards.

Appalachian State has scored 44 points or more in three-straight games for the first time since it did so in four-straight games from Oct. 10-Oct. 31, 2009 (55 vs. North Carolina Central, 44 at Wofford, 52 vs. Georgia Southern, 52 at Furman).

In the 60 games between the end of that stretch and the beginning of the current string of 44-point games, Appalachian State scored 44 or more just eight times.

The Mountaineers have also recorded at least 550 yards of total offense in three-straight games for the first time since they did so during that same prolific four-game stretch in 2009 (644 vs. N.C. Central, 611 at Wofford, 712 vs. Georgia Southern, 554 at Furman).

In the 60 games between the end of that stretch and the beginning of the current string of 550-yard games, Appalachian State amassed 550 yards of offense only six times.

Thanks in large part to its recent success, Appalachian State ranks second in the Sun Belt Conference in scoring, rushing and total offense.

Appalachian State's 469 rushing yards against Georgia State last Saturday were its most since they ran for 572 yards in a 52-28 win over Lenoir-Rhyne on Oct. 18, 1975.

In its previous game (53-14 win at Troy on Oct. 18), Appalachian State posted its highest rushing total (441) since it had 448 yards on the ground in a 56-7 win over Jacksonville on Sept. 6, 2008.

On Oct. 11 against Liberty, the Mountain-

ers notched season highs for total yards (637), passing yards (397), yards per pass attempt (12.8), yards per completion (19.9), and yards per play (9.2).

The Mountaineers' 637 yards against Liberty were their most since they amassed 684 total yards in a 55-14 win over Coastal Carolina on Sept. 29, 2012.

Also against Liberty, Appalachian State had a 300-yard passer (**Taylor Lamb** - 397), two 100-yard rushers (**Marcus Cox** - 111 and **Terrence Upshaw** - 111) and a 100-yard receiver (**Malachi Jones** - 105) in the same game for the first time in school history.

While the Mountaineers have compiled gaudy offensive numbers in each of the last three games, the main differences in big wins over Troy and Georgia State and the overtime loss to Liberty were turnovers and red-zone production. Against LU, App State committed four turnovers (two interceptions, two fumbles) and scored on just 1-of-4 trips into the red zone. In the past two games, the Mountaineers committed a total of just one turnover and were 12-of-14 in the red zone.

Appalachian State is hoping that it has turned a corner in red-zone production. During a four-game losing streak prior to its big win at Troy, App State came away with points in just nine of its 18 trips into the red zone.

In its 11 scoreless red-zone trips over the past six games, Appalachian State has been inside the 10 yard line seven times.

Despite the recent turnaround, Appalachian State still ranks last in the 11-team Sun Belt in red-zone offense this season (30-of-43 — 69.8 percent). This despite the fact that Appalachian is second in the league in both red-zone opportunities (43) and red-zone touchdowns (26).

In their two closest losses of the season (21-20 at Southern Miss on Sept. 20, 55-48 in overtime vs. Liberty on Oct. 11), the Mountaineers outgained their opponents by an average of 126.5 yards per game (455-329 at Southern Miss; 637-501 vs. Liberty). However, Appalachian totaled seven turnovers, missed four field goals and two extra points and was just 4-of-9 in the red zone in those two narrow defeats.

The Mountaineers' 66 points against Campbell on Sept. 6 were the seventh-most in school history and the most since their 70-24 win over Wofford on Oct. 31, 2008.

The Mountaineers' 45 first-half points against Campbell were their most in an opening half since they led Western Carolina 45-21 at halftime of a 79-35 win on Nov. 10, 2007.

App State rushed for an impressive 153 yards in the season opener against Michigan.

Since the beginning of last season (21 games), Appalachian State is one of only six teams to rush for 150 yards against Michigan. Indiana (162), Iowa (168) and Ohio State (393) accomplished the feat in 2013 while Minnesota (206), Michigan State (219) and Indiana (167) have done it this season.

App State is the only team in Michigan's last 12 non-conference games to rush for more than 150 yards against the Wolverines.

In fact, since run-happy Air Force amassed 290 yards on the ground against Michigan on Sept. 8, 2012, eight of U-M's last 12 non-conference opponents have failed to even crack triple-digits in rushing yards.

Also during the season opener at Michigan, Appalachian State put together its longest drive in terms of plays in 25 years with a 19-play, 96-yard touchdown drive that started late in the third quarter and culminated with **Marcus Cox's** one-yard touchdown run with 9:05 to go in the ballgame.

Prior to the opener at Michigan, Appalachian had not put together a 19-play drive since it marched 99 yards in 19 plays versus Marshall on Nov. 4, 1989. That drive was capped by a five-yard touchdown run by quarterback D.J. Campbell.

The 96-yard drive was also the Mountaineers' longest in terms of yardage since they had a lightning-quick two-play, 97-yard series in the first quarter of a 55-14 win over Coastal Carolina on Sept. 29, 2012. Steven Miller

began that possession with a 28-yard run and one play later, Jamal Londry-Jackson connected with Sean Price for a 69-yard touchdown pass.

• Since the beginning of the 2004 season (when Appalachian State started running its spread offense), the Mountaineers have scored 30 points or more 90 times in 141 games (63.8 percent of all games) and have scored 40 points or more 46 times (32.6 percent of all games).

• Appalachian's 55-48 loss to Liberty on Oct. 11 marked only the second time in the last 67 games that Appalachian State has scored 30 or more points and lost.

• During that span, which dates back to Oct. 3, 2009, the Mountaineers are 36-2 when they have scored at least 30 points and just 7-22 when they fail to reach the 30-point plateau.

• Since the beginning of last season, App State is 7-1 when it scores 30 points and 0-12 when it doesn't.

• Another offensive trend for Appalachian State is its propensity to win games when it commits to running the football. Since the beginning of the 2010 season, the Mountaineers are 22-2 when they run the ball 40 or more times and 11-21 when they run the ball less than 40 times.

• During that span, the only times that App State has rushed at least 40 times and lost was on Oct. 19, 2013 at Furman, when it ran the ball 43 times but had five turnovers in a 27-10 defeat, and on Sept. 20 at Southern Miss, when it ran the ball 47 times but had three turnovers and missed three field goals and an extra point in a 21-20 loss.

• Since moving to a spread offense at the beginning of the 2004 campaign, Appalachian State has gained 20 yards or more on 7.2 percent of its offensive plays (668 times in 9,224 plays).

• Over the past two seasons, Appalachian has slumped in the big-play department, managing to gain 20 yards or more on just 88 of its 1,433 offensive snaps (6.1 percent) since the beginning of the 2013 campaign.

• This season, the Mountaineers have gained 20 or more yards on 39 of their 588 offensive plays (6.9 percent), including a season-high eight versus Liberty (Oct. 11) and six at Troy (Oct. 18).

• Ten of Appalachian State's 11 longest plays of the season have come in the last three games.

• Buoyed by Appalachian State's back-to-back 400-yard rushing games, Lamb has only thrown 29 passes over the past two games (Oct. 18 at Troy and last Saturday vs. GSU).

• However, Lamb was a big part of the Mountaineers' 441-yard ground attack at Troy, rushing for a career-high 98 yards. His 98 rushing yards at Troy were the most by an Appalachian State quarterback since DeAndre Presley ran for 264 yards in a snowy NCAA Division I FCS playoff win over Western Illinois on Dec. 4, 2010.

Lamb was spectacular in his starting debut at Southern Miss (Sept. 20), completing 28-of-40 passes for 264 yards and two touchdowns and rushing eight times for 39 yards (303 yards of total offense).

Lamb's 28 completions at Southern Miss were the most-ever by an Appalachian State quarterback in his first-career start. His 264 passing yards ranked second all-time among Mountaineers making their first start (behind only Bake Baker's 298 yards against Marshall in 1996).

Exhibiting great poise for a signal-caller making his first collegiate start, Lamb engineered two fourth-quarter touchdown drives in the one-point loss at USM. He led an eight-play, 74-yard touchdown drive, capped by a 10-yard touchdown pass to **Malachi Jones**, to knot the score at 14-14 with 5:08 to go. After USM retook a 21-14 lead with 2:22 left in the game, Lamb put together a 12-play, 75-yard drive that culminated with a two-yard touchdown pass to **Simms McElfresh** (the PAT was blocked).

Lamb was thrown into the pressure cooker on Sept. 25 at Georgia Southern, making his national-television debut in a hostile environment against Appalachian State's longtime rival. Despite the circumstances, he was impressive again, completing 23-of-42 passes for 256 yards while rushing eight times for 29 yards and a score.

On Oct. 4 against South Alabama, Lamb rushed for a game-high 78 yards on 13 carries (6.0 avg.).

Lamb made an impressive debut in Appalachian State's season opener at Michigan.

His first collegiate series began at his own four yard line but he was unfazed, leading the Mountaineers to a 19-play, 96-yard touchdown drive — the Mountaineers' longest drive in terms of plays in 25 years. Lamb com-

pleted 5-of-9 passes for 37 yards and also ran for six yards during the 19-play scoring drive.

With the emergence of Lamb, Appalachian State now has one of the most experienced backup quarterbacks in the nation in junior **Kameron Bryant**.

Prior to last season, Bryant had made just one appearance in his collegiate career. He made his debut in a 55-14 rout over Coastal Carolina on Sept. 29, 2012 but sustained a season-ending knee injury after just 13 snaps.

RUNNING BACKS

After going three years without having two 100-yard rushers in a single game, Appalachian State has accomplished the feat in each of the last three games.

Sophomore **Marcus Cox** and junior **Ricky Ferguson** kept the streak alive last Saturday against Georgia State when they both set career highs with 250 and 123 rushing yards, respectively.

On Oct. 18 at Troy, Cox and Ferguson both surpassed the 100-yard mark with 123 yards and 107 yards, respectively.

On Oct. 11 versus Liberty, Cox and redshirt freshman running back **Terrence Upshaw** both ran for 111 yards.

Prior to last month, the last time Appalachian State had two 100-yard rushers in the same game was in 2011 when current New Orleans Saint Travaris Cadet had 133 yards and former Detroit Lion Steven Miller had 102 yards in a 49-42 win at The Citadel (Oct. 15).

Cox has been especially effective over the past two games, rushing for a total of 373 yards and six touchdowns while averaging 8.3 yards per carry in the Mountaineers' wins over Troy (Oct. 18) and Georgia State (last Saturday).

Last Saturday against Georgia State, Cox set a career high with 250 rushing yards and matched another with three touchdown runs.

Cox's 250-yard rushing performance against Georgia State was the sixth-best in Appalachian State history and the third-highest total ever for an App State running back.

Cox needed just 19 games to move into Appalachian State's all-time top 10 for career rushing touchdowns, a feat that he accomplished on Oct. 18 at Troy.

For the season, Cox ranks second in the Sun Belt with 819 total rushing yards, third with 102.4 rushing yards per game.

Cox is tied for the Sun Belt lead with 12 rushing touchdowns and his 12 total touchdowns are good for second in the league.

Should Cox rush for 1,000 yards this season (he is on pace to run for 1,229 yards), he would become the first Appalachian State running back to ever record 1,000-yard rushing seasons as a true freshman and sophomore. The only player in program history to ever accomplish the feat was quarterback Armanti Edwards, who had 1,153 rushing yards as a true freshman in 2006 and 1,588 rushing yards as a sophomore in 2007.

Last season, Cox became only the third freshman in school history to rush for 1,000 yards.

In the first start of his career on Sept. 21, 2013 at Elon, Cox became the first player in Appalachian State history with 100 rushing yards and 100 receiving yards in the same game. He amassed 308 all-purpose yards (159 rushing, 149 receiving) and scored three touchdowns (two receiving, one rushing) in the Mountaineers' 31-21 victory at Elon.

A true sophomore, Cox is one of 53 official candidates for the 2014 Doak Walker Award, which is presented annually to college football's top running back.

He is one of only nine underclassmen among the 53 Doak Walker Award candidates.

Cox is one of four Doak Walker Award candidates from the Sun Belt Conference (joining Arkansas State junior Michael Gordon, Louisiana-Lafayette senior Alonzo Harris and Texas State junior Robert Lowe).

Cox is also the only Doak Walker Award candidate from the six NCAA Division I FBS programs in the state of North Carolina.

The second member of Appalachian State's one-two punch at running back, redshirt freshman Terrence Upshaw is just outside of the Sun Belt's top 10 with 430 rushing yards on the season (61.4 yards per game).

• With 109 rushing yards (6.1 avg.) in the season opener at Michigan, Upshaw became the first Appalachian State player in 40 years to rush for 100 yards in his collegiate debut.

• The last Mountaineer to accomplish the feat was quarterback Robbie Price, who ran for 140 yards and a touchdown on just 18 carries against East Tennessee State on Sept. 7, 1974. Price was a sophomore playing in his first varsity game after quarterbacking Appalachian's junior varsity squad in 1973.

• Upshaw and Price are the only players to rush for 100 yards in an Appalachian State debut since the school began keeping full single-game records in 1959.

• Upshaw also became the first non-conference opponent to rush for 100 yards against Michigan since Air Force's Cody Getz had 130 yards on 20 carries against the Wolverines on Sept. 8, 2012. Upshaw is the only player to rush for 100 yards against Michigan in U-M's last 12 non-conference games, which includes two contests against Notre Dame and bowl matchups against South Carolina (2013 Outback Bowl) and Kansas State (2013 Buffalo Wild Wings Bowl).

• With Upshaw slowed by the lower-body injury midway through the Oct. 18 win at Troy, Ferguson has emerged as a third threat at the running back position. Over the past two games, the junior has recorded the first two 100-yard games of his career (107 at Troy and a career-high 123 vs. Georgia State).

WIDE RECEIVERS

• Appalachian State's least-experienced position group is its wide receivers, as evidenced by the fact that five of the nine wideouts that have caught passes for the Mountaineers this season are in their first Division I campaigns.

• Following the graduation of two of the most prolific receivers in school history (Andrew Peacock and Tony Washington, who are now members of the practice squads for

the Detroit Lions and Jacksonville Jaguars, respectively), App State only returned a fraction of its production at wideout from last season.

• The cupboard wasn't left completely bare, however, as the four veteran receivers on Appalachian State's roster — juniors **Malachi Jones**, **Simms McElfresh**, **Bobo Beathard** and **Tacoi Sumler** — have combined for 173 receptions, 2,071 yards and 13 touchdowns in their careers.

• In eight games this season, the M. Jones/McElfresh/Beathard/Sumler quartet has combined for 76 receptions, 1,006 yards and nine touchdowns.

• A former walk-on, McElfresh leads the Mountaineers in receptions (33) and touchdown catches (5) this season.

• McElfresh's five touchdown receptions are tied for fifth in the Sun Belt.

• McElfresh is just outside of the Sun Belt's top 10 with 4.1 receptions per game.

• McElfresh's acrobatic touchdown catch at Michigan drew raves from several national media outlets and personalities. Most notably, *Sports Illustrated's* and NBC Sports' Peter King lauded the outstanding finger-tip catch in his weekly "Monday Morning Quarterback" column on Sept. 1, saying "That catch by Appalachian State's Simms McElfresh, I dare say, is one of the greatest catches I have ever seen."

• McElfresh scored the first rushing touchdown of his career last Saturday when found the end zone from 13 yards out on a fake field goal in Appalachian's 44-0 win over Georgia State (*more on p. 14*).

• After a slow start to his junior campaign, Malachi Jones has 22 receptions for 361 yards and three touchdowns over the past six games.

• Jones leads Appalachian State with 384 receiving yards on the season.

• Appalachian State is also getting contributions from five wideouts playing in their first Division I campaigns this season. Junior-college transfer **Montez McGuire**, redshirt freshman **Dante Jones** and true freshmen **Jaylan Barbour**, **Isaiah Lewis** and **Shaedon Meadors** have combined for 34 receptions and 409 yards over the first seven games of the season.

• After being slowed by an illness that kept him out of action for much of Appalachian State's preseason camp, Meadors made his collegiate debut on Oct. 11 versus Liberty and electrified the home crowd with four receptions for 90 yards, including a 48-yard touchdown catch.

• On his first collegiate play, Meadors caught a short pass from **Taylor Lamb** and turned it into a 30-yard gain.

• McGuire has been one of Lamb's favorite targets. In six games since Lamb took over as starting quarterback, McGuire has 14 receptions for 161 yards.

• McGuire's four receptions for 69 yards during Lamb's debut at Southern Miss (Sept. 20) dwarfed the two catches for 27 yards that he managed over the first two games.

• McGuire was on the receiving end of two passes during the 12-play, 75-yard drive that pulled Appalachian State within 21-20 in the waning seconds of the heartbreaking loss at Southern Miss, including a 17-yard gain on fourth-and-10 from USM 29 yard line.

• Lewis had a breakout performance on Oct. 4 against South Alabama with four receptions for 34 yards and his first-career touchdown catch on a seven-yard pass from **Kameron Bryant**.

• Prior to busting out for four catches and 34 yards against USA, Lewis had totaled just six receptions for 24 yards over the first four games of his career.



OFFENSE

TIGHT ENDS

Appalachian State has two veterans at tight end in sophomore Barrett Burns and senior Drew Bailey.

The duo has combined for 45 receptions, 458 yards and seven touchdowns in their careers.

Burns is the more consistent receiving threat of the duo, as his 36 catches and 333 yards in 17 career games are higher totals than Bailey has amassed in his four-year career (10 catches for 125 yards).

In the next-to-last game of last season (Nov. 16 at Wofford), Burns set career highs with eight catches for 63 yards. The eight receptions were the most by an Appalachian State tight end since Daniel Wilcox had 10 against Troy on Sept. 9, 2000 and the 63 yards were the most by a Mountaineer TE since Ben Jordan's 76 against Wofford in 2008.

While Bailey is primarily used as a blocker, he is a legitimate pass-catching threat, particularly in the red zone. Five of his 10 career receptions have been touchdowns.

On Oct. 4 against South Alabama, Bailey made his first catch in nearly two years on a two-yard touchdown from Lamb. The reception was his first since he hauled in a 10-yard touchdown in the second round of the 2012 NCAA Division I FCS playoffs against Illinois State (Dec. 1, 2012).

OFFENSIVE LINE

Appalachian State boasts one of the most experienced groups of offensive linemen in the nation this season.

Appalachian State's offensive linemen have combined to make 183 career starts, which is tied for the most by any group of linemen in NCAA Division I FBS, according to research originally compiled for Phil Steele's 2014 College Football Preview.

* Ten of Davante Harris' 16 career starts came on the defensive line before he moved to the offensive front in 2013, thereby reducing Appalachian State's number of starts at an offensive-line position to 173.

Despite the veteran experience, a new crop of talented young linemen has taken over the majority of the starting lineup this year. For the last three games (Oct. 11 vs. Liberty and Oct. 18 at Troy), the Mountaineers' starting five up front included two freshmen (RT Beau Nunn and RG Colby Gossett) and a sophomore (LG Parker Collins).

Senior Graham Fisher made his first start of the season at center on Oct. 18 at Troy. Prior to this season, Fisher had started 28-of-29 games dating back to the final five contests of the 2011 campaign.

During the 53-14 rout at Troy, Fisher joined a rare and, perhaps, exclusive club.

In the waning seconds of the first half, Fisher recorded a safety when he tackled Troy defensive back Mark Wilson in the end zone following a Mountaineer fumble.

Making the safety even more noteworthy is the fact that Fisher, who has never played a position outside of the offensive line during his collegiate career, also has a reception to his credit.

In addition to the safety at Troy, Fisher was credited with a 13-yard reception when he rumbled for a first down after catching a deflected pass against Montana in 2012.

DEFENSE

After surrendering 102 points and 1,088 yards in losses to South Alabama (Oct. 4) and Liberty (Oct. 11), Appalachian State's defense has allowed a total of just seven points and 370 yards in its last two games (wins at Troy on Oct. 18 and versus Georgia State last Saturday).

In last Saturday's 44-0 win over Georgia State, Appalachian State surrendered just 62 total yards, which is the fewest that the Mountaineers have allowed since Guilford managed just 39 yards in a 22-0 Appalachian win on Guilford on Nov. 4, 1961.

Georgia State's eight rushing yards were the fewest that Appalachian State has allowed since it surrendered just five in a 55-21 win over North Carolina Central on Oct. 10, 2009.

Georgia State, which came into last Saturday's contest with the nation's 15th-ranked passing offense (316.2 ypg), managed just 54 yards through the air against the Mountaineers (262 below its season average coming in). The 54 passing yards were the fewest in GSU's five-year program history (the previous low was 74 at Alabama in 2010, GSU's first season).

The shutout against GSU was Appalachian State's second this season (66-0 vs. Campbell on Sept. 6) and the 22nd since Appalachian joined the NCAA Division I ranks in 1972.

The Mountaineers have recorded two shutouts in a season for the first time since 1998, when they blanked VMI (51-0) and Eastern Kentucky (19-0) on back-to-back weeks (Nov. 7 and 14).

In a 53-14 win at Troy on Oct. 18, Appalachian State limited the Trojans to seven offensive points (Troy also scored on a 99-yard kickoff return) and just 308 yards of total offense.

Appalachian held Troy to 79 rushing yards on 32 carries (2.5 avg.) just one week after the Trojans racked up 360 yards on the ground in a 41-24 win over New Mexico State.

Since Troy scored on its opening possession on Oct. 18, the Mountaineers have not sur-

rendered any points in their last 22 defensive series. App State has forced 11 punts, four turnovers on downs, four fumbles and three interceptions during the 22-straight scoreless defensive series.

- Making the defensive effort over the last two games even more impressive is the fact that only five of the Mountaineers 128 tackles have been recorded by seniors (all five by **Deuce Robinson** against Georgia State last Saturday).
- On the strength of the back-to-back stellar defensive performances, Appalachian State has climbed to second in the Sun Belt Conference in total defense (366.6 ypg).
- Appalachian State also ranks among the Sun Belt's top defenses against the pass (third — 197.9 ypg) and run (t-fourth — 168.8 ypg).
- The Mountaineers lead the Sun Belt and are tied for 17th nationally with 1.4 interceptions per game (11 total).
- Interceptions have long been a staple of App State's defense. In its final six seasons in the Southern Conference (2008-13), Appalachian led the league in interceptions four times and averaged 15.3 INTs per season (92 total).
- Since the beginning of the 2012 campaign, Appalachian State has tallied at least five tackles for loss in 24 of its 32 ballgames, including 15 times in 20 games since the beginning of last season.
- In all, the Mountaineers have notched 187 tackles for loss for 613 yards since the beginning of the 2012 campaign (5.8 TFL for 19.2 yards per game).
- On Oct. 18 at Troy, Appalachian State made eight stops behind the line of scrimmage for 43 yards. The 43 yards on tackles for loss were the most racked up by the Mountaineers since Western Carolina lost 50 yards on nine TFL against App State on Oct. 27, 2012.
- Over the past three games (Oct. 11 vs. Liberty, Oct. 18 at Troy, last Saturday vs. Georgia State), Appalachian has racked up 21 tackles for loss for 80 yards.

- Appalachian State's 6.6 tackles for loss per game this season rank third in the Sun Belt and are tied for 43rd nationally.
- Prior to the last two games, the Mountaineers' top defensive performances of the season came against Campbell (Sept. 6) and Southern Miss (Sept. 20).
- After Southern Miss scored two touchdowns in the first 17 minutes of the game, Appalachian State's defense clamped down for much of the rest of the contest.
- In USM's first eight possessions following their second touchdown (which came with 13:28 to go in the second period), App State surrendered just 101 total yards (12.6 yards per series, 2.9 yards per play). In those eight series, the Mountaineers forced six three-and-outs.
- The Mountaineers limited Campbell to just 95 yards of total offense, marking the first time since a 35-10 victory at Western Carolina on Nov. 22, 2008 that App State surrendered less than 100 yards in a game.
- Campbell's six first downs were the fewest for an Appalachian State opponent since Mars Hill moved the sticks only five times in the Mountaineers' 41-0 shutout victory in 2006 (App State also surrendered only six first downs against Georgia State last Saturday).

DEFENSIVE LINE

Appalachian State's most experienced group on defense is its defensive line, where it boasts a combined 100 career starts.

- However, like Appalachian State's offensive line, young talent has prevailed over experience across the defensive front, as two current starters (NT **Tyson Fernandez** and DE **Olawale Dada**) had combined for two career starts coming into this season.
- The Mountaineers' leader on the defensive line and, perhaps the entire defense, is junior end **Ronald Blair**. Blair returned to the field this season after missing the final 10 games of last year due to a combination of issues, not the least of which was a severe thumb injury that required surgery.
- Blair, who has started all 34 games that he has played in his Appalachian State career, leads Appalachian State with 3.0 sacks and 8.0 tackles for loss this season and 10.5 sacks and 29.5 tackles for loss in his career. His 128 career tackles rank third on the squad.
- For the season, Blair is tied for 17th in the Sun Belt with 3.0 total sacks and is tied for eighth in the league with 8.0 tackles for loss.
- Blair's performance was one of the few defensive bright spots in Appalachian's 47-21 loss to South Alabama on Oct. 4. He led all players with a sack and a career-high 2.5 tackles for loss against USA.
- Like Blair, senior **Deuce Robinson** earned a starting role as a true freshman and has 26 career starts under his belt.
- Robinson ranks second on the team behind Blair with 6.5 career sacks and 17.5 tackles for loss.
- Robinson turned in his best performance of the season last Saturday against Georgia State with 1.5 sacks and a fumble recovery. The 1.5 sacks and tackles for loss were season highs and the fumble recovery was his first takeaway of the campaign.
- Robinson's 1.5 sacks on the season (all collected last Saturday against GSU) are good for second on the team.



DEFENSE

Despite his experience Robinson, who has been plagued by injuries for most of the past year, has been passed on the depth chart by sophomore **Olawale Dada**.

This season, Dada ranks second on the team with 5.5 tackles for loss and is tied for third on the squad with one sack. The touchdown was Appalachian State's first on a fumble return since **Joel Ross** returned a fumble 47 yards for a score against Wofford in 2012.

In just 12 career games (and only seven starts), Dada has amassed 36 tackles, seven tackles for loss, a sack and two quarterback hurries.

On Oct. 18 at Troy, Dada scooped up a fumble forced by linebacker **Oswaldo Sombo** and returned it 20 yards for a touchdown.

At nose tackle, Appalachian State boasts a 325-pounder and 330-pounder to clog up the middle in sophomores **Tyson Fernandez** and **Darian Small**.

With Appalachian's defensive-line depth thinned significantly by injuries late last season, Fernandez was moved from offensive line to nose tackle the week prior to the Mountaineers' Nov. 2 contest versus Chattanooga. Just five days after he went through his first practice on defense, Fernandez started at nose tackle against UTC and ranked second among App State's defensive linemen with four tackles in the contest.

Fernandez has tallied 30 tackles in just 12 career games at nose tackle.

Small had his best statistical performance of the season on Oct. 11 against Liberty with three tackles and a quarterback hurry. His three stops against Liberty are more than he has made in the other seven games of the campaign combined (2).

LINEBACKERS

Sophomore linebacker **John Law** has established himself as one of the Sun Belt Conference's top defensive players.

After a slow start to the campaign (just 10 tackles over the first two games), Law has exploded for 52 stops over the last six contests.

Law's 16 tackles at Georgia Southern on Sept. 25 are the fifth-most in a single-game by a Sun Belt player this season and the most by a Mountaineer since former App State linebacker Karl Anderson recorded 16 stops against Charleston Southern last season.

Law's eight stops at Southern Miss on Sept. 20 included a career-high 2.5 tackles for loss, which are tied for the most by a Mountaineer in any game this season.

Despite only being a sophomore, Law ranks second on the team with 135 career tackles.

Unfortunately for the Mountaineers, senior **Brandon McGowan**, who started the first six games of the season at the ILB spot opposite Law, will miss the rest of the season due to a knee injury sustained against Liberty on Oct. 11.

Despite missing the Mountaineers' last two games, McGowan is still tied for fifth on the team with 27 tackles, including a career-high-tying 10 on Sept. 25 at Georgia Southern.

McGowan's 10 stops at Georgia Southern matched the career high he originally set last year against the Eagles.

After tallying just three tackles and not seeing action three times in the first five weeks of last season, McGowan recorded 67 tackles over the final 13 games of his career.

With McGowan out of the lineup, true freshman **Eric Boggs** has made the last two starts. Boggs led Appalachian State with six tackles last Saturday against Georgia State.

With McGowan out of the lineup, junior **D.J. Ward** also saw the first extensive playing time of his career on Oct. 18 at Troy and responded with a team- and career-high nine tackles.

Appalachian State has two true freshman among its four starting linebackers. In addition to Boggs at ILB, true freshman **Devan Stringer** has started three-straight games at outside linebacker.

Stringer replaced sophomore **Rashaad Townes**, who has been plagued by recurring upper-body injuries throughout much of his young career, in the starting lineup.

Stringer made the first sack of his career at Troy (Oct. 18).

Despite coming off the bench for the past three games, Townes still ranks fourth on the team with 30 tackles this season.

Twice this season, Townes has made seven or more tackles (seven vs. Campbell on Sept. 6, eight at Georgia Southern on Sept. 25).

At the other outside linebacker spot, sophomore **Kennan Gilchrist** is tied for fifth on the team with 27 tackles this season.

Junior **Oswaldo Sombo** made the first start of his career in place of Gilchrist last Saturday against Georgia State and was tied for fifth on the squad with three tackles.

The previous week at Troy (Oct. 18), Sombo forced a fumble that was returned 20 yards for a touchdown by defensive end **Olawale Dada**. The touchdown was Appalachian State's first on a fumble return since **Joel Ross** returned a fumble 47 yards for a score against Wofford in 2012.

In all, four linebackers rank among Appalachian State's top six in tackles this season (Law - 1st, 62; Townes - 4th, 30; McGowan - t-5th, 27; Gilchrist - t-5th - 27).

DEFENSIVE BACKS

- Despite being the most inexperienced position group on the defensive side of the ball, Appalachian State's defensive backs have combined for 195 tackles and nine interceptions in eight games this season.
- Three App State defensive backs — junior safety **Doug Middleton**, senior cornerback **Joel Ross**, sophomore safety **Alex Gray** and sophomore cornerback **Dante Blackmon** — have combined for 63 career starts. However, the rest of the DBs on the roster have combined for just 15 starts (eight for true freshman safety **A.J. Howard**, five for freshman cornerback **Latrell Gibbs** and one each by sophomore cornerback **Jordan Ford** and junior safety **Aaron Krah**).
- Of the 11 defensive backs that have seen action for the Mountaineers this season, five (Howard, Gibbs, redshirt freshmen **Treyon Garnett** and **Brandon Pinckney** and junior-college transfer **Jordan Ford**) are in their first Division I campaign and eight (the above plus sophomores Blackmon and **Alex Gray**) have played one season or less at the Division I level.
- Two true freshmen — Howard at strong safety and Gibbs at cornerback — are in the Mountaineers' starting lineup.
- Gibbs had the finest performance of his career on Oct. 18 at Troy with two interceptions and a career-high eight tackles.
- Three Mountaineers that rank among the Sun Belt's top eight in interceptions.

- With .38 interceptions per game, Middleton and Ross are also tied for 28th among all NCAA Division I FBS players this season.
- In addition to their ball-hawking skills, Middleton and Ross rank second and seventh on the team with 50 and 26 tackles this season, respectively.
- Ross' 140 career tackles are most on the team while Middleton's 124 rank fourth.
- Middleton's 6.2 tackles per game this season are good for a tie for 24th in the Sun Belt.

- Howard is also proving to be one of the team's top tacklers, as he is tied with Middleton for second on the team and 24th in the Sun Belt with 50 tackles this season (6.2 per game).
- Howard's 13 tackles against Liberty on Oct. 11 were a career high and the most by an Appalachian State defensive back since Corey Lynch made 13 stops against Montana State in the second round of the 2006 NCAA Division I FCS playoffs against Montana State (Dec. 2, 2006).

SPECIALISTS

- Appalachian State continues to rank at or near the bottom of the 11-team Sun Belt Conference in most special-teams categories, including ninth in PAT percentage (33-37 — .892), ninth in net punting (34.4 avg.), 10th in kickoff-return average (17.8 avg.), 11th in net kickoff coverage (35.1 avg.) and 11th in field-goal percentage (5-11 — .455).
- The special-teams struggles were especially apparent when the Mountaineers left 10 points on the field in the kicking game with three missed field goals and a missed PAT in a 21-20 loss at Southern Miss on Sept. 20.
- Two of the missed kicks (a field goal and the PAT) at Southern Miss were blocked.
- On Oct. 4 against South Alabama, Appalachian State had another field-goal attempt blocked and also lost a fumble on a muffed punt.
- Field-goal kicking has been improved over the past two games, as sophomore **Bentlee Critcher** has taken over the place-kicking duties and made 4-of-6 field goals.
- However, Critcher's first miss was a would-be game-winning 32-yard attempt as time expired in the Mountaineers' 55-48 overtime loss to Liberty on Oct. 11.
- Critcher has also been strong on kickoffs during his three games in the place-kicking role, with 15 of his 25 kicks going for touchbacks. However, one of his kickoffs was returned 99 yards for a touchdown on Oct. 18 at Troy.
- In the punting game, Critcher is looking to regain the form that saw him put together one of the best campaigns by a punter in Appalachian State history as a true freshman last season.

- Critcher, who arrived at Appalachian State last August 2013 as a walk-on, not only won the job but went on to rank fifth among all NCAA Division I punters (FCS or FBS) with a 45.9-yard punting average in '13.

Thanks in large part to Critcher, Appalachian State's 40.57-yard net punting average ranked third among FCS programs and was good for 11th overall in Division I in 2013.

Critcher turned in one of the best performances in school history on Oct. 12 of last year when he booted nine punts for a 54.9-yard average (good for the fourth-best single-game average in Appalachian State history) against Samford

This season, Critcher is averaging 41.2 yards per punt, which ranks eighth in the Sun Belt. However, nine of his 28 punts (32.1 percent) have been downed inside the 20 yard line.

Prior to sustaining an upper-body injury on Sept. 25 at Georgia Southern that has kept him out of action for much of the last three contests, Zach Matics served as Appalachian State's place kicker.

Matics was a perfect 12-for-12 (1-for-1 on field goals and 11-for-11 on extra points) prior to missing 4-of-5 kicks (three field goals and an extra point) at So. Miss on Sept. 20.

Matics missed his fourth-straight field-goal attempt on Oct. 4 against South Alabama when his 34-yard attempt was blocked.

Last Saturday versus Georgia State, Appalachian State pulled off a perfectly executed fake field goal to score a touchdown on the final play of the first half.

The Mountaineers appeared content with the opportunity to stretch its 20-0 lead to 23-0 when they lined up for a 30-yard field goal with three seconds remaining in the first half. However, after GSU took three-straight timeouts, holder Simms McElfresh took the snap and ran through a gaping hole on the right side of the line for a 13-yard TD.

MISCELLANEOUS

YOUTH MOVEMENT

For the second-straight year, Appalachian State is likely fielding one of college football's youngest squads with just 11 seniors and a whopping 49 freshmen on its current 103-player roster.

Of Appalachian's 11 seniors, two have sustained season-ending knee injuries (starting ILB Brandon McGowan and reserve QB/start-up holder Logan Hallock) and a third (OL Alex Acey) will miss this week's game due to a lower-body injury.

Sixty-four of App State's 103 players (62.1 percent) are in their first or second in the program while just 32 (31.1 percent) are upperclassmen.

WELCOME TO THE ROCK

Appalachian State enjoys one of the finest home-field advantages in the nation at Kidd Brewer Stadium, where the Mountaineers are 69-14 (.831) in 83 home games since the beginning of the 2003 season.

Despite less-than-ideal weather for all four contests, Appalachian State has drawn 25,861 (Sept. 6 vs. Campbell), 24,215 (Oct. 4 vs. South Alabama), 26,058 (Oct. 11 vs. Liberty) and 22,643 (Nov. 1 vs. Georgia State) for its four home games this season.

In its first season in the Sun Belt Conference, Appalachian State currently ranks third in the league in average home attendance.

ANN ARBOR, Mich. — Michigan broke open a 14-0 ballgame with three touchdowns in the final four minutes of the first half and went on to avenge its 2007 loss to Appalachian State University football with a 52-14 win over the Mountaineers at Michigan Stadium.

Appalachian State (0-1) remained within striking distance for most of the first half but Michigan's three touchdowns over a 3:11 span in the waning minutes before halftime squelched any hopes of the Mountaineers replicating their historic victory over the No. 5-ranked Wolverines seven season openers ago.

Michigan's three-touchdown spurt was sparked by stopping true freshman Jaylan Barbour just short of a first down on third-and-seven from the Appalachian State 30 yard line more than halfway through the second quarter. On fourth-and-inches from the 37, App State was forced to punt after failing to get a play off and calling timeout.

On the first play after the punt, Michigan's Derrick Green rushed 59 yards to the Appalachian State 23 and two plays later, Devin Funchess caught his third touchdown pass of the first half from Devin Gardner and U-M stretched the lead to 21-0.

The Mountaineers were forced to punt again on their ensuing possession and Michigan needed just two plays — 61 and 12 yard runs by De'Veon Smith — to make it 28-0 with 1:26 to go in the half.

Just 38 seconds later, U-M's Mike McCray got a hand on a punt by Bentlee Critcher and Ben Gideon returned the block 32 yards for a touchdown that gave the Wolverines a 35-0 halftime lead.

After being limited to just 74 yards and no points in the first half, Appalachian State put together a pair of long touchdown drives after the break.

Midway through the third quarter, starting quarterback Kameron Bryant engineered an 11-play, 75-yard drive that was capped by an acrobatic eight-yard touchdown catch by Simms McElfresh in the back of the end zone that got the Mountaineers on the board.

In the final period, redshirt freshman Taylor Lamb led an impressive 19-play, 96-yard drive that culminated with a one-yard touchdown run by Marcus Cox.

However, the story of the game offensively for Appalachian State was redshirt freshman running back Terrence Upshaw, who rushed for 109 yards on 18 carries (6.1 avg.) in his collegiate debut. Cox, who did not start after missing much of the last two weeks of practice due to a lower-body injury, picked up 47 yards on 11 rushes (4.3 avg.). McElfresh led the Mountaineers with five receptions while Barbour tallied a team-high 40 receiving yards.

Michigan was paced by Funchess, who had game highs with seven receptions and 95 receiving yards — including touchdown catches of nine, 34 and eight yards. In the process, he became the first Wolverine to ever haul in three touchdown receptions in a season opener.

Green (170) and Smith (115) both rushed for 100 yards for Michigan while Gardner completed 13-of-14 passes for 173 yards. In all, the Wolverines doubled the Mountaineers up in terms of total yardage (560-280).

NOTES: Appalachian State safety Doug Middleton led all tacklers with eight ... App State was 0-for-9 on third downs before McElfresh's touchdown catch on third-and-goal midway through the third quarter ... the Mountaineers finished 5-of-17 on third downs while Michigan was 5-of-8 ... Appalachian fell to 3-9 in its last 12 season openers (all 12 have been played on the road) ... the Sun Belt Conference fell to 2-22 all-time versus Big Ten opponents ... the game was Michigan's first ever against a Sun Belt member.

BOONE, N.C. — Simms McElfresh, Marcus Cox and Ricky Ferguson each scored two touchdowns and Appalachian State University football opened the home portion of its 2014 schedule with its largest win in 73 years, a 66-0 triumph over Campbell at Kidd Brewer Stadium.

Appalachian State's 66-point margin of victory was the fourth-largest in school history and the largest since the Mountaineers blanked Arkansas-Monticello, 67-0, on Sept. 27, 1941. Appalachian's 66 points were the seventh-most in program history and its most since it hammered Wofford, 70-24, on Oct. 31, 2008.

App State (1-1) led 10-0 after one quarter but scored five touchdowns in the second period to grab a commanding 45-0 halftime lead.

The Mountaineers' 35-point second quarter included a stretch of three touchdowns in 3:41 and four scores in 7:43 and was highlighted by a 52-yard interception return by Doug Middleton.

A severe storm that passed through the Boone area near the end of halftime delayed the start of the second half by 52 minutes but the Mountaineers found the end zone three times in their first five possessions after the break to close out the rout.

Appalachian State outgained Campbell (0-2), 538-95, and forced four turnovers in its first shutout since it blanked Mars Hill, 41-0, on Sept. 16, 2006.

Cox led the Mountaineers' offensive outburst by rushing for 114 yards and two touchdowns (both from two yards out) on 20 carries. The 100-yard game was the seventh in 11 career starts for the sophomore Doak Walker Award candidate, who did not start last Saturday's season opener at Michigan after missing much of preseason camp with a lower-body injury.

Cox's effort was augmented by three Mountaineers who averaged at least six yards a rush — quarterback Taylor Lamb, who ran for 68 yards on five carries (13.6 avg.), Ferguson, who had 48 yards and two scores (11 and seven yards) on eight carries (6.0 avg.) and Terrence Upshaw, who amassed 41 yards and a 10-yard touchdown on just four carries (10.2 avg.).

Kameron Bryant led the way through the air, throwing for 149 yards and two touchdowns on 10-of-17 passing. Lamb added 94 yards and a touchdown on 5-of-10 passing.

McElfresh led all receivers with five catches for 81 yards, including his touchdown receptions of 12 and 39 yards. Tight end Barrett Burns added 43 yards on two catches, including a 21-yard touchdown.

Defensively, the Mountaineers racked up two sacks and seven tackles for loss in the shutout. Outside linebacker Rashaad Townes led the squad with seven tackles while Joel Ross and Stephen Machanic added interceptions to go along with Middleton's.

Thanks in large part to App State's stout defensive effort, the Mountaineers' offense had an average starting field position at its own 49 yard line.

NOTES: Appalachian State moved to 62-20-2 (.750) all-time in home openers with its 12th win in its last 14 lid-lifters at Kidd Brewer Stadium ... the Mountaineers moved to 2-0 all-time versus Campbell in the schools' first gridiron meeting since Sept. 19, 1931 (a 20-6 Appalachian win) ... App State moved to 34-1 in its last 35 home games against in-state opponents ... the shutout was Appalachian's 18th all-time in a home opener but its first since it blanked North Carolina A&T, 45-0, on Sept. 17, 1994 ... the Mountaineers' 45 first-half points were the most that they scored in an opening half since they led Western Carolina, 45-21, at halftime of a 79-35 win on Nov. 10, 2007 ... Appalachian State avoided having consecutive 0-2 starts for the first time since 1992-93 and losing consecutive home openers for the first time since 1982-83 ... Appalachian committed its first turnover of the season late in the third quarter when Bryan was intercepted by Campbell's Isaac Scott ... McElfresh's two-touchdown game was the first of his career ... Ferguson's touchdowns were the first of his career ... Upshaw's touchdown run and Lamb's touchdown pass were career firsts ... the attendance of 25,861 marked the 52nd time in its last 53 regular-season games that Appalachian State played in front of a crowd larger than the official seating capacity at Kidd Brewer Stadium (which is currently 23,150).

HATTIESBURG, Miss. — Taylor Lamb threw what appeared to be a game-tying two-yard touchdown pass to Simms McElfresh with six seconds to go but the ensuing extra point was blocked and Appalachian State University football suffered a heartbreaking 21-20 defeat at Southern Miss at M.M. Roberts Stadium.

Lamb, who was making his first-career start, engineered two touchdown drives in the final eight minutes of the game, including a 12-play, 75-yarder that was capped by McElfresh's over-the-shoulder catch in the back corner of the end zone that looked like it would send the contest to overtime. However, Southern Miss' Dasman McCullum blocked the extra point to maintain the Golden Eagles' one-point lead.

Southern Miss (2-2) recovered the ensuing onside kick and knelt out the clock to escape with the victory.

Appalachian State (1-2) dominated USM in most statistical categories, including total yards (455-329), rushing yards (191-61), first downs (29-16), third/fourth-down conversions (8-of-16 to 2-of-11) and time of possession (35:51-24:09). However, the Mountaineers had three turnovers, came away with just three scores on five trips in the red zone, committed 11 penalties and, most glaringly, left 10 points on the field in the kicking game. In addition to the block extra point with six seconds to go, App State also missed all three of its field-goal attempts.

Southern Miss jumped out to a 14-0 lead less than two minutes into the second quarter but Appalachian State's defense limited the Golden Eagles to just 101 total yards and 2.9 yards per play over their next eight possessions. The Mountaineers forced six three-and-outs during the eight-series stretch.

The dominant defensive performance allowed App State to get back into the game. The Mountaineers got on the board midway through the second quarter on a five-yard touchdown run by Marcus Cox and tied the game at 14-14 with 5:08 to go in the game on a 10-yard pass from Lamb to Malachi Jones.

However, following Jones' game-tying touchdown catch, Southern Miss responded with a six-play, 65-yard drive and retook a 21-14 lead on George Payne's third touchdown of the evening, a 31-yard reception from Nick Mullens, with 2:22 remaining.

On the next series, Lamb needed just 2:16 to move the Mountaineers 75 yards for the would-be game-tying score.

The final drive capped a terrific starting debut for Lamb. The redshirt freshman completed 28-of-40 passes for 264 yards and two touchdowns and ran eight times for 39 yards.

McElfresh and Jones were Lamb's favorite targets, as they both recorded seven receptions and a touchdown catch. McElfresh finished with 68 yards while Jones tallied 61.

Cox ran for a game-high 119 yards on 22 carries (5.4 avg.).

Appalachian State's outstanding defensive performance was led by inside linebacker John Law, who recorded eight tackles, including 2.5 for loss and a sack. Safety Doug Middleton added seven stops and cornerback Joel Ross had two interceptions.

NOTES: Appalachian State is 1-2 for the third-consecutive season ... the Mountaineers lost a regular-season game that immediately followed a bye for the first time since a 35-32 defeat at James Madison on Sept. 20, 2008 ... STATESBORO, Ga. — Appalachian State University football's red-zone struggles continued in a 34-14 loss to Georgia Southern at Paulson Stadium.

Like in last Saturday's 21-20 loss at Southern Miss, Appalachian State (1-3, 0-1 Sun Belt) squandered several scoring opportunities in Thursday's defeat. The Mountaineers came away with points on just two of five trips into the red zone in their first-ever Sun Belt Conference game.

After a disastrous start that put it in a 17-0 hole less than three minutes into the second quarter, Appalachian regrouped with a pair of long scoring drives to cut the deficit to 24-14 at halftime.

Making the second start of his career, redshirt-freshman quarterback Taylor Lamb engineered a 12-play, 75-yard drive and put the Mountaineers on the board with a 19-yard touchdown run that made it 17-7 midway through the second period.

Georgia Southern (3-2, 2-0 Sun Belt) stretched the lead to 24-7 with a little more than two minutes to go in the opening half but Lamb responded by marching the Mountaineers 74 yards in 1:55 to pull back within 10 points. A 27-yard pass to Malachi Jones and a 25-yard pass to Simms McElfresh headlined the eight-play drive, which was capped by a one-yard touchdown dive by Marcus Cox that sent the Mountaineers to the locker room trailing just 24-14.

The momentum carried over to the second half and Appalachian drove deep into Georgia Southern territory on the opening series after the break. However, the drive stalled when Georgia Southern defensive end Quaan Daniels made a first-down saving tackle on Lamb's quarterback keeper on fourth-and-four from the nine yard line and the Mountaineers turned the ball over on downs.

App State had another golden scoring opportunity on its very next series when Tucker Bell blocked a GS punt and the Mountaineers took over at the Eagles' 30 yard line. Once again, Appalachian moved inside the Georgia Southern 10 but, once again, it came away empty when Lamb was intercepted at the one yard line by Nick Wright.

For all intents and purposes, Georgia Southern put the game away when it milked 8:58 off the clock on its ensuing drive before settling for a 35-yard field goal by Alex Hanks that made it 27-14. One possession later, the Eagles closed the scoring on a six-yard touchdown run by quarterback Kevin Ellison.

Appalachian drove inside the Eagles' 15 yard line for the fifth time on its final possession but came away empty when it turned the ball over on downs at the GS 12.

In addition to the red-zone woes, Appalachian State allowed 408 rushing yards, possessed the ball for only 21:52 and converted just 4-of-13 third downs in the loss.

On the flip side, Lamb was impressive for the second-straight week, completing 23-of-42 passes for 256 yards while rushing eight times for 29 yards and a score. His favorite target was McElfresh, who caught seven passes for 64 yards (both game highs). Jones and Montez McGuire had four receptions apiece for 59 and 49 yards, respectively.

Defensively, linebacker John Law led Appalachian State with a career-high 16 tackles. Safety Doug Middleton also set a new career high with 10 stops and recorded his second interception of the season.

NOTES: The loss snapped Appalachian State's three-game winning streak versus longtime rival Georgia Southern and was only its fourth loss in the last 12 meetings with the Eagles ... Appalachian lost at Paulson Stadium for only the second time in the last 10 years (2010) ... over the last two games, Appalachian State has scored on just five of its 10 trips into the red zone ... with just 74 rushing yards, App State failed to run for 100 yards for the first time in six games, dating back to it managing just 32 rushing yards at Georgia on Nov. 9 of last season ... true freshman Latrell Gibbs made the first start of his career at cornerback.

BOONE, N.C. — Appalachian State University football fell into a 20-0 hole less than 19 minutes into the game and never recovered in a 47-21 loss to South Alabama at Kidd Brewer Stadium.

South Alabama (3-2, 2-1 Sun Belt) racked up 582 yards of offense — including 192 in the first quarter and 346 in the first half — to hand Appalachian State (1-4, 0-2 Sun Belt) the defeat in its first Sun Belt Conference home game.

South Alabama scored on four of its first six possessions to jump out to the commanding 20-0 lead with 6:26 to go in the first half. USA's advantage could have been even bigger but App State blocked one field-goal attempt and the Jaguars missed another.

Despite facing the 20-point deficit, Appalachian State appeared to grab momentum midway through the second quarter after South Alabama's Maleki Harris delivered a vicious hit to the head of Appalachian wideout Simms McElfresh. Harris was ejected following the targeting foul and three plays later, Taylor Lamb threw a 20-yard touchdown pass to Malachi Jones and the Mountaineers cut the deficit to 20-7.

After the score, Appalachian forced South Alabama to punt for the first time but the Mountaineers couldn't score again before the halftime and went into the break trailing 20-7.

App State's hopes of a second-half comeback evaporated when South Alabama scored touchdowns on each of its first three possessions after the break to take an insurmountable 40-7 lead.

The Mountaineers found paydirt twice in the fourth quarter on touchdown passes from Lamb to senior tight end Drew Bailey and backup quarterback Kameron Bryant to true freshman receiver Isaiah Lewis but it was not enough to avoid suffering their worst home loss in nearly 30 years, dating back to a 34-7 defeat at the hands of Western Carolina on Oct. 6, 1984.

Making his third-career start, Lamb rushed for a career-high 78 yards on 13 carries (6.0 avg.) but completed just 16-of-30 passes for 152 yards, which was his lowest total since taking over the starting role. Jones was his top target with four catches for 64 yards and a score.

Quarterback Brandon Bridge led South Alabama's 582-yard performance by completing 19-of-28 passes for 339 yards and three touchdowns while running nine times for 23 yards and a score. His favorite target was Shavarez Smith, who caught six passes for 133 yards and two scores.

Appalachian State linebacker John Law led all tacklers with 11.

NOTES: South Alabama's 582 yards were the most that Appalachian State has allowed since The Citadel racked up 618 yards in a 52-28 win at Kidd Brewer Stadium on Sept. 15, 2012 ... the 582 yards are the second-most that USA has ever amassed in its six-year football history (record: 630 versus Troy in 2013) ... Lamb's two touchdown passes matched a career high ... Bailey's fourth-quarter touchdown catch was his first reception since he caught a 10-yard touchdown against Illinois State in the second round of the 2012 NCAA Division I FCS playoffs ... Lewis' touchdown catch was the first of his career ... Appalachian State sophomore running back Marcus Cox had just 16 yards on eight carries, matching the lowest rushing total of his 17-game career (he had 16 yards on three carries in his collegiate debut at Montana on Aug. 31, 2013) ... Appalachian State fell to 68-13 in its last 81 home games ... Saturday's attendance of 24,215 marked the 53rd time in the last 54 regular-season home games that Appalachian State has played in front of a crowd larger than Kidd Brewer Stadium's official seating capacity (which is currently 23,150) ... former Appalachian State coach Jerry Moore was honored with pregame and halftime tributes in recognition of his upcoming induction in the College Football Hall of Fame.

BOONE, N.C. — Behind a record-setting performance by redshirt freshman quarterback Taylor Lamb, Appalachian State University football racked up 637 yards of offense but four costly turnovers and a missed field goal proved to be the difference in a 55-48 overtime loss to Liberty at Kidd Brewer Stadium.

The game was a back-and-forth affair throughout, featuring five ties and seven lead changes. However, it was decided on two crucial Appalachian State miscues in the waning moments of the contest.

With the score tied at 48-48 and two seconds remaining in regulation, Bentlee Critcher narrowly missed a 32-yard field goal to send the game to overtime. Then, after Liberty scored on the first possession of overtime, Lamb overthrew tight end Barrett Burns in the end zone and was picked off by Liberty safety Jacob Hagen to end the game.

Unfortunately, the game-ending interception overshadowed the best performance by a freshman passer in Appalachian State history. Lamb's 397 yards shattered the longstanding Appalachian freshman record of 334 passing yards, set by Randy Joyce against VMI on Oct. 17, 1981.

Making the fourth start of his career, Lamb completed 20-of-31 passes to six different receivers, including touchdowns of 63 yards to Simms McElfresh, 60 yards to Bobo Beathard and 48 yards to Shaedon Meadors. His 48-yard strike to Meadors gave the Mountaineers their first lead of the second half at 37-34 with 6:42 to go in the third quarter.

Less than two minutes later, App State extended the lead to 40-34 on a 38-yard field goal by Critcher but Liberty took a 41-40 advantage into the final period thanks to D.J. Abnar's one-yard touchdown dive with 29 seconds left in the third.

The Flames' one-point lead didn't last long into the fourth quarter, as Appalachian jumped back out in front on a 60-yard touchdown run by Terrence Upshaw less than three minutes into the period.

Liberty answered with a 12-play, 75-yard drive, capped by a 13-yard touchdown run by quarterback Josh Woodrum that knotted the score for the fifth time at 48-48 with 6:19 remaining in regulation.

Needing only a field goal to win the game, Appalachian marched 60 yards in 14 plays on its ensuing possession while milking all 6:19 off the clock. Upshaw and Marcus Cox combined to rush for 33 yards on the drive and Lamb completed 3-of-3 passes for 24 yards, including a 12-yard pass to McElfresh on third-and-six from the 23 yard line that moved the Mountaineers well within Critcher's range.

However, two plays later, Critcher pushed the 32-yard attempt just wide of the right upright. In fact, the kick was so close that the play was reviewed but the call was confirmed and the game went to overtime.

After Appalachian State won the coin toss and elected to play defense first, Liberty needed only six plays to find paydirt on a nine-yard pass from Woodrum to Darrin Peterson.

Needing a touchdown to send the game to a second extra period, the Mountaineers picked up 16 yards on the first play of their overtime possession on a hard-nosed run by Cox. On the next play, Lamb's errant pass was picked off by Hagen to end the game.

Appalachian State's outgained Liberty, 637-501, while averaging a whopping 9.2 yards per play, including 12.8 yards per pass attempt and 19.9 yards per completion. However, it could not overcome its four turnovers (two fumbles and two interceptions), seven penalties for 58 yards and 1-of-4 efficiency in the red zone.

In addition to Lamb's 397 passing yards, the Mountaineers featured two 100-yard rushers (Cox and Upshaw both finished with 111) and a 100-yard receiver (Jones — 105).

Liberty also had a 300-yard passer (Woodrum — 356), 100-yard rusher (Abnar — 129) and 100-yard receiver (Dante Shells — 164).

Defensively, Appalachian State true freshman safety A.J. Howard led all players with 13 tackles. LU's Kenny Scott recorded five stops and two fumble recoveries, including one that he returned 39 yards for a touchdown to give Liberty (4-3) a 28-21 lead midway through the second quarter.

NOTES: Lamb's 397 yards were the eighth-highest passing total in Appalachian State history and the most since Armanti Edwards threw for 415 at Wofford in 2009 ... Beathard's and Meadors' touchdown catches were the first of their careers ... Meadors made his Appalachian debut on Saturday and caught a 30-yard pass on his first collegiate play in the first quarter ... TROY, Ala. – Appalachian State University football put together a dominating performance and picked up its first-ever Sun Belt Conference victory with a 53-14 rout over five-time Sun Belt champion Troy on at Veterans Memorial Stadium.

After falling into an early 7-0 hole, Appalachian State (2-5, 1-2 Sun Belt) scored 53 of the game's final 60 points – including 29 unanswered to close it out – and finished with a 551-308 advantage in total yardage in the win, its first over an NCAA Division I FBS opponent since its historic 34-32 win at No. 5 Michigan in 2007.

Aided by two penalties and a conversion on fourth-and-eight, Troy (1-6, 1-2 Sun Belt) scored on its opening possession to grab the early 7-0 lead but it was all Mountaineers from there.

App State needed exactly one play to draw even as, for the second-straight game, the Mountaineers scored on their first offensive snap when Taylor Lamb found Malachi Jones for a 59-yard touchdown pass to knot the score at 7-7.

The Mountaineers' touchdown on their first offensive play opened a 24-point onslaught over the next 15 minutes that gave App State a commanding 24-7 lead less than six minutes into the second quarter. The early scoring barrage included a 37-yard field goal by Bentlee Critcher, defensive end Olawale Dada's 20-yard return of a fumble forced by outside linebacker Osvaldo Sombo and the first of three touchdown runs by Marcus Cox, a two-yarder that gave Appalachian the 17-point advantage with 9:56 still left to play in the first half.

Troy cut the Apps' advantage to 24-14 on a 99-yard kickoff return by Chandler Worthy (his second kickoff return for a touchdown in as many games) but that would be the last points the Trojans' would score.

App State took a 26-14 lead into halftime thanks to a bizarre safety on the final play of the first half. With 13 seconds to go in the half and Appalachian on Troy's eight yard line, Lamb completed a pass to wideout Montez McGuire near the goal line. As McGuire tried to stretch the ball into the end zone for a touchdown, he fumbled into the arms of Troy defensive back Mark Wilson. When he caught the ball, Wilson ran back into Troy's end zone where he was tackled by App State center Graham Fisher that stretched the Mountaineers' lead to 12 points with one second remaining on the first-half clock.

As dominant as Appalachian State was in the first half, it was even more so after the break when it outscored the Trojans, 27-0, to finish off the romp. Cox scored on runs of 33 and one yard, Lamb ran it in from 16 yards out and backup quarterback Kameron Bryant closed out the scoring on a three-yard run with 10:22 still left in the ballgame.

Appalachian State's 551 yards included a whopping 441 on the ground, good for the Mountaineers' highest rushing total since they ran for 448 yards against Jacksonville on Sept. 6, 2008.

For the second-straight week, Appalachian's ground attack featured two 100-yard rushers in Cox (123 yards on 16 carries) and junior Ricky Ferguson, who came off the bench to amass 107 yards on 10 carries. The Mountaineers nearly had four 100-yard rushers, as Lamb ran for a career-high 98 yards on eight carries and Terrence Upshaw rushed 11 times for 82 yards before leaving the game with a minor lower-body injury in the third quarter.

Defensively, Appalachian State forced four turnovers, limited Troy to a 7-of-20 conversion rate on third and fourth downs and surrendered just one touchdown in the win. The Mountaineers also held the Trojans, who rushed for 360 yards in last week's 41-24 win over New Mexico State, to just 79 yards on 32 carries (2.5 avg.).

True freshman cornerback Latrell Gibbs headlined the stout defensive performance with career-high eight tackles and the first two interceptions of his career, the first of which set up an Appalachian State touchdown. Inside linebacker D.J. Ward led the Mountaineers with a career-high nine tackles.

NOTES: Appalachian State, which is in its first season as a member of NCAA Division I FBS, beat an FBS team for the first time since its historic 34-32 victory over Michigan on Sept. 1, 2007 ... the win snapped Appalachian's 10-game losing streak against FBS opponents ... the Mountaineers snapped a four-game losing streak with the win and avoided dropping five-straight games for the first time since 1977 ... App State moved to 2-2 all-time against Troy and 2-1 at Veterans Memorial Stadium ... the Mountaineers' 39-point margin of victory was its largest in a conference game since it toppled Wofford, 70-24, in a Southern Conference matchup on Oct. 31, 2008 ... the 39-point margin of victory was also the second-largest in a Sun Belt game this season, behind only Arkansas State's 52-10 win over Georgia State last Saturday ... the Mountaineers' 441 rushing yards were the second-most by a Sun Belt team this season, behind only Georgia Southern's 564 rushing yards against Savannah State on Sept. 6 ... only a sophomore, Cox moved into Appalachian State's all-time top 10 on Saturday for rushing touchdowns in a career ... his 24 career rushing touchdowns are tied for seventh in school history with Alvin Parker (1980-83) ... with three touchdown runs on Saturday, Cox surpassed D.J. Campbell (22 – 1989-92), Richie Williams (22 – 2002-05) and current head coach Scott Satterfield (23 – 1992-95) on Appalachian State's all-time rushing touchdowns list ... Fisher, a senior that has never played a position outside of the offensive line during his collegiate career, has a safety and a reception to his credit – in addition to the safety at Troy, he had a 13-yard catch on a deflected pass against Montana in 2012.

BOONE, N.C. — In a driving High Country snowstorm, Appalachian State University football put together a second-straight dominating performance and routed visiting Georgia State, 44-0, at Kidd Brewer Stadium.

In its first season as a member of the NCAA Division I FBS Sun Belt Conference, Appalachian State (3-5, 2-2 Sun Belt) collected its first-ever Sun Belt home win and its first-ever home triumph over an FBS opponent.

The victory came in even more impressive fashion than the Mountaineers' 53-14 romp at Troy in their Oct. 18 outing. Appalachian outgained Georgia State (1-8, 0-6 Sun Belt), 567-62, including a 469-8 advantage on the ground. App State also easily outdistanced the Panthers in first downs (26-6), possession time (38:40-21:20) and third/fourth down conversions (11-of-18 for App State, 3-of-13 for GSU).

Appalachian State's 469 rushing yards were its most in 39 years, dating back to its 572 yards in a 52-28 win over Lenoir-Rhyne on Oct. 18, 1975. Defensively, Georgia State's 62 total yards were the fewest that the Mountaineers surrendered in 53 years, dating back to a 22-0 win over Guilford on Nov. 4, 1961.

Additionally, GSU's eight rushing yards were the fewest that App State allowed since North Carolina Central managed just six in a 55-21 Appalachian win on Oct. 10, 2009 and the Mountaineers' 505-yard advantage was their largest since they outgained Georgia Southern, 712-171, in a 52-16 win on Oct. 24, 2009.

The outcome was decided early, as Appalachian State scored what proved to be the only points it would need less than four minutes into the game. Linebacker John Law intercepted GSU quarterback Nick Arbuckle on the fifth play of the game and five plays later Marcus Cox capped a 33-yard drive with a one-yard touchdown run that made it 7-0.

The Mountaineers stretched the lead to 20-0 on an 11-yard touchdown run by quarterback Taylor Lamb late in the first quarter and a six-yard run by Cox early in the second.

Appalachian maintained the 20-point lead late into the first half and appeared to be content with the opportunity to take a 23-0 advantage into halftime when Bentlee Critcher lined up for a 30-yard field goal with three seconds to go in the half. However, after Georgia State took three-consecutive timeouts in an apparent attempt to ice Critcher, the Mountaineers responded with a perfectly executed fake and Simms McElfresh, the holder on the would-be field-goal attempt, rushed straight up the middle for a 13-yard touchdown run that stretched the Mountaineers' lead to 27-0 at the break.

After the half, the only question that remained was whether the Mountaineers would maintain the shutout. GSU's only true threat to put points on the board came early in the fourth quarter when a 35-yard return on Appalachian's lone punt of the game and a 15-yard penalty for an illegal tackle at the end of the play gave the Panthers the ball inside App State's 20 yard line. However, six plays, Appalachian State's Deuce Robinson recovered a fumble on a botched handoff exchange and the Mountaineers went on to finish off their second shutout of the year.

While the nearly constant snowfall was likely a factor, Appalachian State's defensive effort played a large part in limiting nation's 15th-ranked aerial attack to just 54 yards, 262 below its Sun Belt-leading 316.2 passing yards per game coming in. Most notably, the Mountaineers recorded a season-high four sacks, including a season-best 1.5 by Robinson and forced three turnovers, including two takeaways by Law (an interception and a fumble recovery).

Georgia State's 54 passing yards were the fewest in its five-year program history, 20 yards less than its previous low of 74 versus Alabama in GSU's inaugural season of 2010.

Offensively, Cox ran for a career-high 250 yards and three touchdowns on just 29 carries (8.6 avg.). Over the past two games, the Doak Walker Award candidate has rushed for 373 yards on 45 carries (8.3 avg.) and six scores.

For the third-straight game, Appalachian's rushing attack featured two 100-yard rushers, as junior Ricky Ferguson went over the 100-yard mark for the second game in a row with a career-best 123 yards on just 14 carries (8.8 avg.).

NOTES: Appalachian State amassed at least 500 yards of offense for the third-straight game (637 vs. Liberty on Oct. 11, 551 at Troy on Oct. 18 and 567 on Saturday vs. GSU) ... the Mountaineers have recorded two shutouts in a season for the first time since 1998, when they blanked VMI (51-0) and Eastern Kentucky (19-0) in back-to-back weeks (Nov. 7 and 14) ... prior to accomplishing the feat in each of the last three games, Appalachian had not featured two 100-yard rushers in any contest since 2011 when current New Orleans Saint Travaris Cadet (133 yards) and Steven Miller (102) both surpassed the 100-yard plateau against The Citadel (Oct. 15) ... Appalachian moved to 20-1 in its last 21 home games played in the month of November ... the Mountaineers moved to 11-3 all-time versus opponents from the state of Georgia at Kidd Brewer Stadium.
